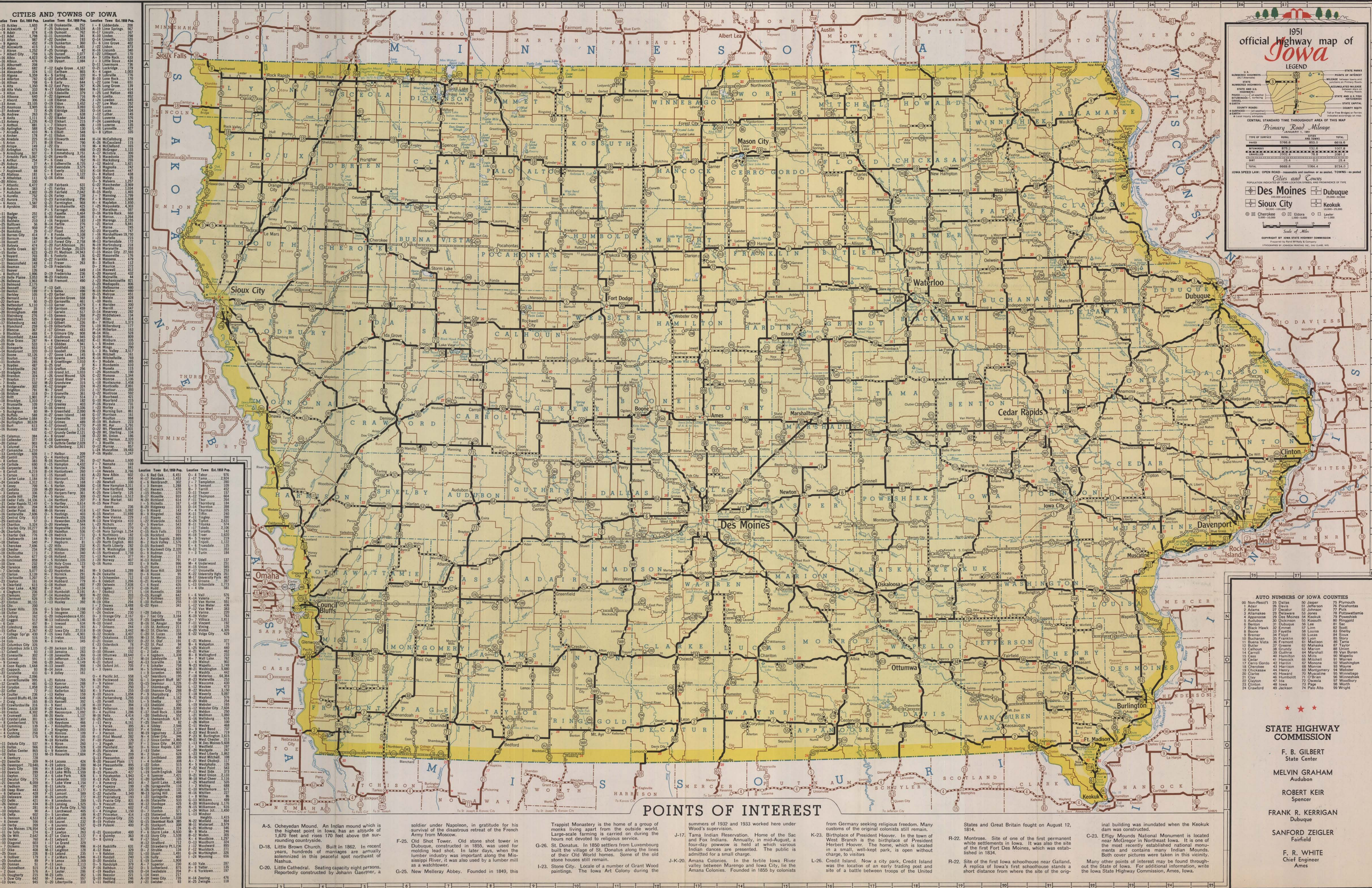

POINTS OF INTEREST

A-5. Ocheyedan Mound. An Indian mound which is the highest point in Iowa, has an altitude of 1,670 feet and rises 170 feet above the surrounding countryside.

D-18. Little Brown Church. Built in 1862. In recent years, hundreds of marriages are annually solemnized in this peaceful spot northeast of Nashua.

C-20. Little Cathedral. Seating capacity eight persons. Reportedly constructed by Johann Gaertner, a soldier under Napoleon, in gratitude for his survival of the disastrous retreat of the French Army from Moscow.

F-25. Old Shot Tower. Old stone shot tower in Dubuque, constructed in 1855, was used for molding lead shot. In later days, when the lumber industry was important along the Mississippi River, it was also used by a lumber mill as a watchtower.

G-25. New Mellieray Abbey. Founded in 1849, this Trappist Monastery is the home of a group of monks living apart from the outside world. Large-scale farming is carried on during the hours not devoted to religious service.

G-26. St. Donatus. In 1850 settlers from Luxembourg built the village of St. Donatus along the lines of their Old World homes. Some of the old stone houses still remain.

I-23. Stone City. Locale of a number of Grant Wood paintings. The Iowa Art Colony during the summers of 1932 and 1933 worked here under Wood's supervision.

J-17. Tama Indian Reservation. Home of the Sac and Fox Indians. Annually, in mid-August, a four-day powwow is held at which various Indian dances are presented. The public is admitted for a small fee.

J-K-20. Amana Colonies. In the fertile Iowa River valley between Marengo and Iowa City, lie the Amana Colonies. Founded in 1855 by colonists from Germany seeking religious freedom. Many customs of the original colonists still remain.

K-23. Birthplace of President Hoover. In the town of West Branch is the birthplace of President Herbert Hoover. The home, which is located in a small, well-kept park, is open without charge to visitors.

L-26. Credit Island. Now a city park, Credit Island was the location of an early trading post and site of a battle between troops of the United States and Great Britain fought on August 12, 1814.

R-22. Montrose. Site of one of the first permanent white settlements in Iowa. It was also the site of the first Fort Des Moines, which was established in 1824.

R-22. Site of the first Iowa schoolhouse near Galtand. A replica of Iowa's first schoolhouse stands a short distance from where the site of the original building was inundated when the Keokuk dam was constructed.

C-23. Effigy Mounds National Monument is located near McGregor in northeast Iowa. It is one of the most recently established national monuments and contains many Indian mounds. Both cover pictures were taken in this vicinity.
