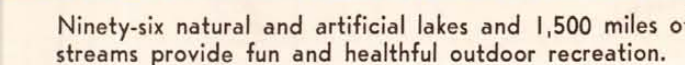
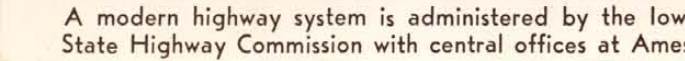
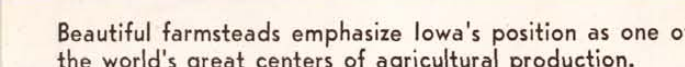


In 1958, the industrial and agricultural output in the State totalled more than \$7,300,000,000.

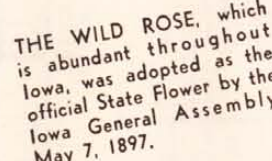




A modern highway system is administered by the low State Highway Commission with central offices at Ame

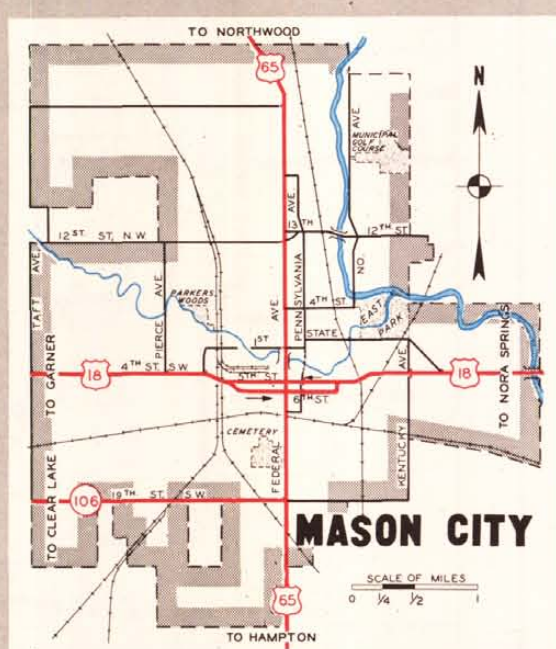


THE WILD ROSE, which is abundant throughout Iowa, was adopted as the official State Flower by the Iowa General Assembly May 7, 1897.

CIVIL RIGHTS IN IOWA

All persons within this state shall be entitled to the full and equal enjoyment of the accommodations, advantages, facilities and privileges of inns, restaurants, chop-houses, eating houses, lunch counters, and all other places where refreshments are served, public conveyances, barber shops, bathhouses, theatres, and all other places of amusement. (735.1 Code of Iowa)

PUNISHMENT

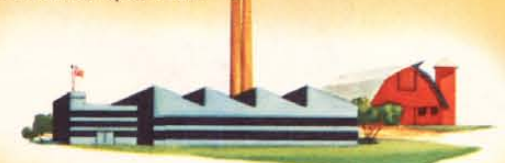
Any person who shall violate the provisions of section 735.1 by denying to any person, except for reasons by law applicable to all persons, the full enjoyment of any of the accommodations, advantages, facilities, or privileges enumerated therein, or by aiding or inciting such denial, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine not to exceed one hundred dollars or imprisonment in the county jail not to exceed thirty days. (735.2 Code of Iowa)

SPEED LIMITS

State and U.S. Routes — Day, 70; Night, 60. Trucks — Day-Night, 50. Boat and Travel Trailers (24-foot or under including tow-bar — Max. weight, 3,000 lbs.) Day-Night, 55. Interstate — Day, 75; Night, 65; Minimum, 40. County — Day, 60; Night, 50. Also "As Posted" in towns or on open road.

IOWA INDUSTRY

**ROADSIDE PARKS • REST AREAS**

One hundred and twenty-five roadside parks and safety rest areas are located along Iowa's primary and interstate highways. These areas are indicated on the highway map with a red dot; roadside parks providing free electricity carry the red dot and circle symbol, and the Interstate safety rest areas are identified with a small red square. Facilities provided include tables, fire-places or charcoal burners, and trash cans. No overnight camping is permitted.



STATE PARKS • RECREATION

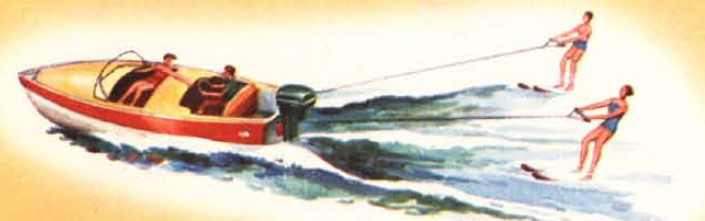
The Iowa State Conservation Commission has jurisdiction over ninety-one state parks and preserves comprising more than 28,000 acres. There are also seven state forest areas and one forest nursery, totaling over 13,000 acres. Iowa has seventy-two natural lakes and twenty-four artificial lakes with a total of 46,386 acres, 900 miles of inland meandering streams, and 100 miles of bordered navigable waterways.

streams which are available for the enjoyment of the public. Most state parks and preserve areas have parking and picnic facilities; in addition to other conveniences for park visitors. Many provide overnight camping. The pine tree symbol used on the highway map locates the State Parks. A solid pine tree indicates that overnight camping is permitted in the park.

Six and one-half million persons are visiting the Iowa state parks annually. In all areas, the natural flora and fauna are encouraged, and every effort is made to keep the larger portion of the areas in a natural state. In monument areas, preservation and restoration work is being done in an effort to hold and perpetuate the state's historical background. The beauty of the state's native flowers, topography and landscape may be enjoyed by all our citizens and visitors in Iowa's excellent state park system.
