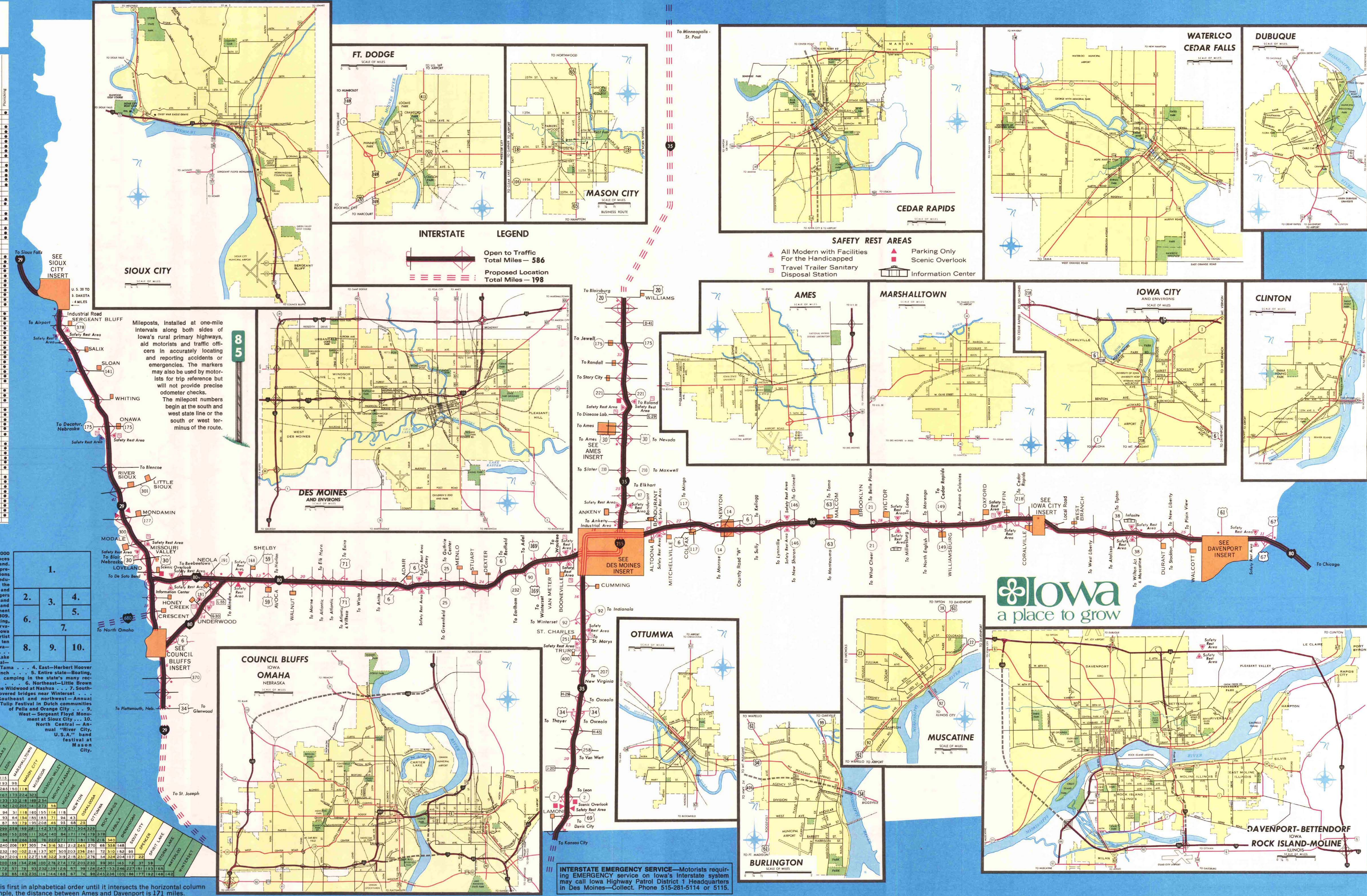

HOW TO USE THIS DISTANCE TABLE: Follow down the vertical column under the name which is first in alphabetical order until it intersects the horizontal column opposite the second name. This figure is the distance in miles between the two cities. For example, the distance between Ames and Davenport is 171 miles.



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
