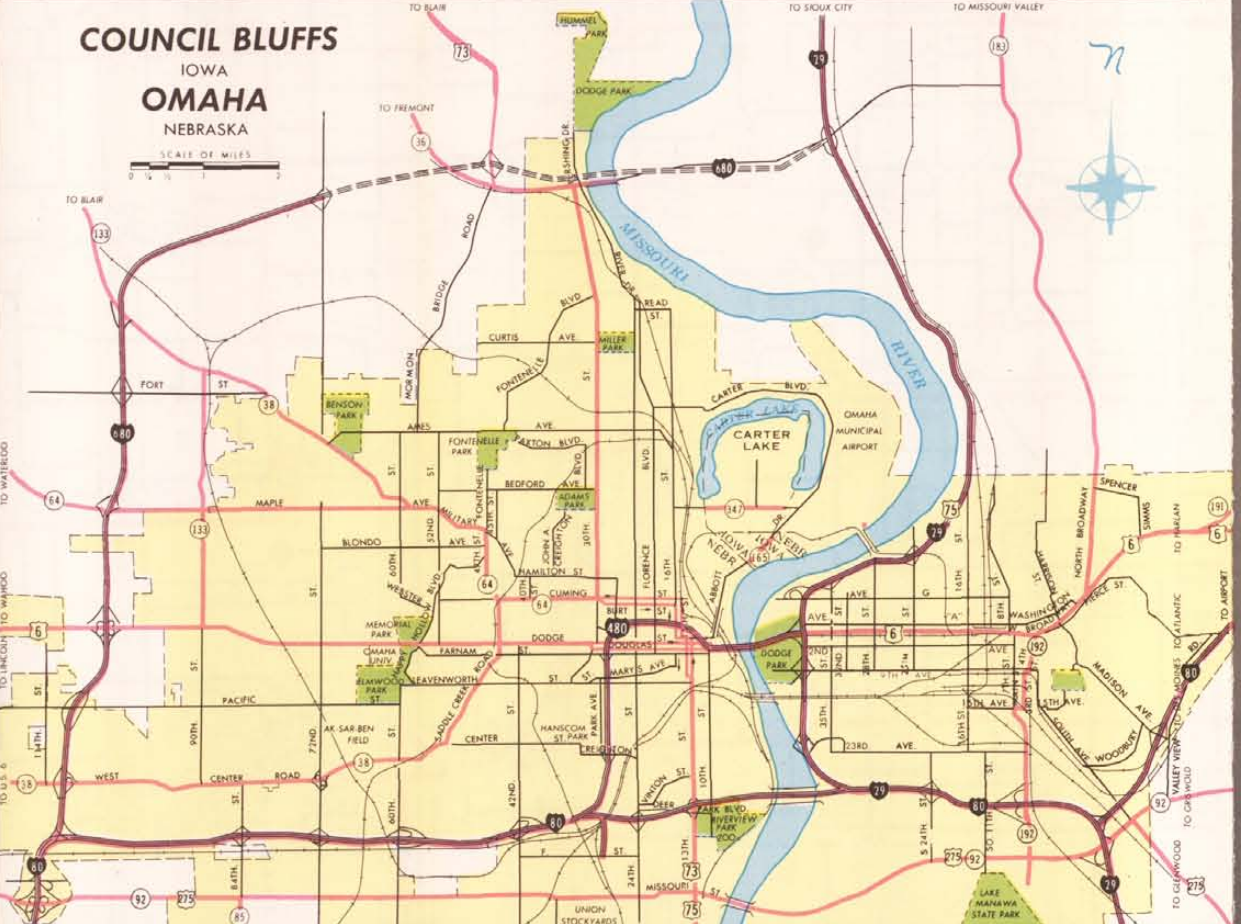

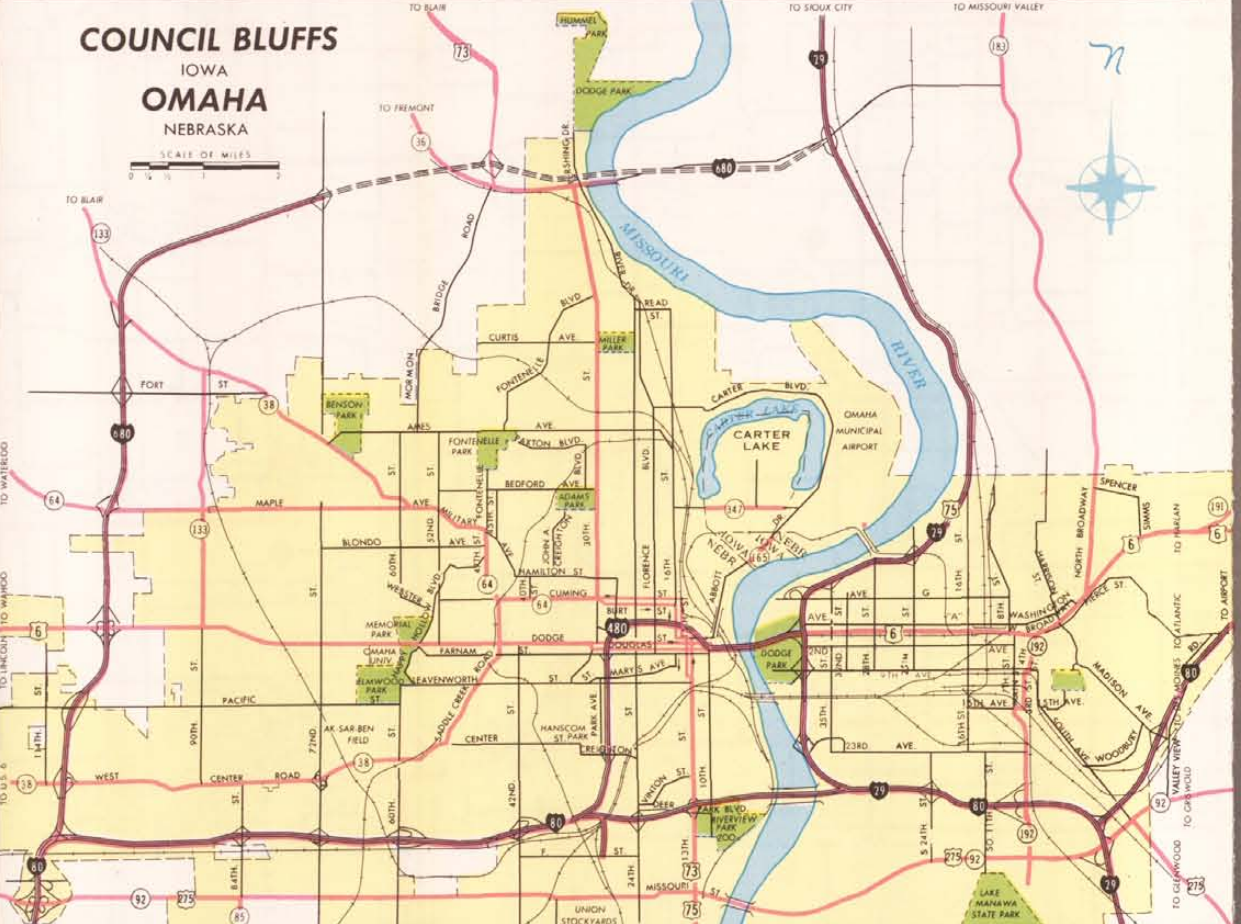
Mileposts, installed at one-mile intervals along both sides of Iowa's rural primary highways, aid motorists and traffic officers in accurately locating and reporting accidents or emergencies. The markers may also be used by motorists for trip reference but will not provide precise odometer checks. The mileposts numbers begin at the south and west state line or the south or west terminus of the route.
